Share with each other. Then pray that God would give you His peace this season.


Read Luke 1:29-30.


Break out a pack of glow sticks.

Read Luke 1:39-56.




Parents, share about a particularly special or unique Christmas that you experienced as a child.

What do you think Bethlehem was like when


Jesus was born?

Read Luke 2:20.




Jesus' name means "the Lord is salvation"!
