| 1. | Connection Question: What's something you didn't get as a kid that you totally though |

- **3.** Compare the Two Sons: The younger son rebels. The older son obeys but is still distant. Which one do you relate to more right now and why? (You can also reflect on different seasons of life.)
- **4. Symptom Check:** Mark walked us through six symptoms of elder brother lostness. Which one stood out to you most and why? (Lack of joy, anger, slavery to performance, judgmentalism, lack of assurance, coldness toward the Father)

| 5. | Performance vs. Relationship: The older brother says, "I've been slaving for you" Have you ever felt like your relationship with God was more about duty than delight? What does it look like to follow Jesus in freedom rather than performance? |

| 6. | Grace at My Expense: The older brother resented the party — partly because the fattened calf came from what was now his inheritance. Have you ever found yourself frustrated when someone else received grace or blessing you didn't think they deserved? Why do you think that's such a hard thing for us to celebrate? |
| 7. | Spiritual Coldness: Mark said, "You can live under the Father's roof and still be cold toward His heart." What are some signs that you might be drifting into spiritual coldness — even while "doing the right things"? |
| 8. | The Open Ending: Jesus ends the story without telling us what the older brother decides. Why do you think He leaves it open? What does that open ending invite you to do? |
| 9. | Coming Home: Mark closed the message with this question: "Will you allow Jesus to take you home to the Father?" What would that next step look like for you personally? |
